



urrah! Yippee! Calcutta (Kolkata) is the city we forget when exploring India. The first hits are Delhi, Rajasthan and Mumbai, yet Calcutta is magnificent... And now there is a property in the countryside to rest awhile: the Rajbari Bawali, beautifully restored, a soothing mix of French château meets shabby chic-but nothing shabby about it. Immaculate gardens, lake, huge swimming pool, lightfilled royal suites, flickering candles by night, a spa, visits to the Bon temples, a return to charming sitting rooms and a palatial courtyard. India's northeast now has a new circuit: expert Mary-Anne Denison-Pender of Mahout recommends a Shakti Sikkim village walk, followed by a stay at the

darling Glenburn Tea Estate, near Darjeeling, staying in the Glenburn penthouse (and the Oberoi Grand is a Raj grande dame), then the Rajbari Bawali. greavesindia.co.uk

And... Wait for it... Oberoi has also opened a new Vilas property-the first in 15 years-in Chandigarh. Biki Oberoi's Vilas properties-the spectacular Rajvilas in Jaipur, Amarvilas in Agra, Udaivilas in Udaipur and Vanyavilas in Ranthambhore-revolutionized luxury travel in India. Chandigarh is a UNESCO World Heritage Site for the Le Corbusierdesigned Capitol Complex, and the resort, Sukhvilas, opened in December, with the spa set to open this April. This pioneers a circuit from the Punjab to the Himalayas. Sukhvilas has 60 villas and tents, many with private

pools and gardens, tinkling fountains and waterways. There's an on-site farm, plus food from local growers: so on-trend. greavesindia.co.uk

And... Alila, a forward-thinking hotel group that has done terrific properties in Bali, China and Sri Lanka, has restored Fort Bishangarh, between Delhi and Jaipur. Mughal-British architecture, battlements, spa, 59 suites and a cigar turret. What more do you want? ampersandtravel.com

And... There's nothing like an Englishman Abroad (reference Richard Hanlon,

who owns Bujera Fort, the hottest ticket in Udaipur; and Mark Hill's Jalakara Hotel on Havelock Island in the Andamans). George Cooper, an interior designer, made Kahanda Kanda, in a working tea plantation near Galle, Sri Lanka, the cool go-to place. Now he has opened KK Beach: four suites that are a tad Corbusier-by-the-sea, just 12km from Galle on the Indian Ocean, brand-new and as white-sparkly as the sand. No shoes, seafood barbecues, open-plan, laid-back. It's kick-back delicious. And he now has a boutique in Galle Fort, so take an empty suitcase. ampersandtravel.com
