The coast is clear

Adam Jacot de Boinod takes a tour from Colombo to Tangalle and back, and discovers a cornucopia of Sri Lankan gems, temples, peacocks, grand hotels – and an undisturbed feeling of peace



have to go back. It's so uplifting to be part of this harmonious tri-angle of mankind, animal and nature. And, of all the tropical islands I have visited, Sri Lanka has the

most heady mix of exoticism.

On arrival, I have a one-night stopoff at the Wallawwa (thewallawwa.com), which refers to itself as "my house near Colombo" - with good reason. It's a great hideaway and resting spot, with spa, à la carte restaurant, team of butlers and five acres of tropical landscaped gardens, just 15 min-utes' drive from the airport – and an easy 18 miles to the capital.

The next morning and I'm off on my

adventure - though rather than Co-lombo, I'm travelling 50 miles inland,

to Ratnapura, home of Sri Lankan jew-

to Ratnapura, home of Sri Lankan jew-ellery, in search of gems.

No time to hang around, as I'm due in the fishing town of Tangalle, 75 miles south-west, on the coast that meets the Indian Ocean. Along this strip is the new Anantara Peace Haven resort (tangalle.anantara.com), where guests receive a theatrical welcome with traditional blessings. A beauted man is full. tional blessings. A bearded man in full costume blows his conch and three girls

costume flows nisconcin and tinree gris-sing and drum.

Walking around the area, I feel a real delight in witnessing the skill of the workers, who, up to their knees in mud in the paddy fields, leave behind them immaculate rows of rice. To taste the

product that evening makes me appre-ciate my food all the more.

A stone's throw away from Anantara, or five minutes in a tuk-tuk, is Amanwella (aman.com/resorts/amanwella), a stunning hotel tucked away in a cove. Amanwella means "peace and beach". It's a signature Aman hotel, enhancing what's already in the environment with the lines and colours, spaces and

with the lines and colours, spaces and angles of the buildings. I find myself stopping in my tracks to appreciate fully the brilliance of the design.

On I go, past the famous temple at Dikwella, 20 minutes down the coast to the west, and the large sprawl at Matara, past the beautiful half-moon bay at Mirissa and the already develbay at Mirissa and the aiready devel-oped Weligama, before finally return-ing inland to Lake Koggala and my next hotel, the Kahanda Kanda (ka-handakanda.com), which stands on the north-west side of the water basin. Five miles from Galle, this style-cassis and the lake the lake the style-

conscious hotel looks down from its hilltop perch over a 12-acre tea plantation. Most of the movement within the complex is along or across a saffron wall. It's all designed to be reassuringly familiar for a principally British clientele, with scattered Country Life magazines in the lobby-cum-library.

My next treat is at the nearby Maliga Kanda (thehideawaysclub.com). It's part of the Hideaways Club Classic Collection portfolio, which has properties all around the world. conscious hotel looks down from its

have the hassle of maintenance. Mon-keys hang, swing and jump all around the trees that encircle the villa. Meaning "Mountain Palace", Mali-ga Kanda is perched on a hill. There's music in the jungle here, especially with the dawn chorus. Colourful birds abound, peacocks strut around, while fixed its ship out like mini stays and I fireflies shine out like mini stars, and I am soon a twitcher, straining to spot

am soon a whitch; straining to spot the cormorants, eagles, kingfishers, blue pigeons and grosbeaks. I take the most wonderful walk down through the village where I feel all of the island's innocence and time-less charm. Elderly ladies parade in pairs beneath their vivid parasols. Old men stick their legs out at right angles on old bicycles that cause them to adopt staunch postures.

My next stop, the Amangalla Hotel (aman.com/resorts/amangalla), brings with it the period charm of a bygone era. Formerly the officers' mess within the ramparts of the historic fort of Galle, it's full of character, with trianguar stairwells and wonky tiles

When I dine at the restaurant, I choose well: an avocado gazpacho and a "salami-thin" beetroot and qui-noa salad, followed by seared scallops

noa salad, followed by seared scallops beside an aubergine ravioli.

The library is like a museum, with fusty old prints of Ceylon, backgammon sets and back-broken atlaness, objects in glass cases and, most symbolically, a Union Flag folded in the corner.

Finally, I make my way back up the west coast to Colombo, where I stay at the boutique hotel Maniumpathy (maniumpathycom) in the heart of the city. Off the main road and secure behind a grand façade and porch, it features lattice artwork and has columns lifted to prevent the threat of monsoon floods. The interior houses an old-fashioned dining room with a lovely fashioned dining room with a lovely long ebony table and a sitting room that is cosy and convivial. Teak and mahogany are also much in evidence.

I pick up a copy of the Sinhala dic

tionary, the language spoken by Sri Lanka's largest ethnic group. It has Lanka's largest ethnic group. It has some wonderful vocabulary, especially those alluding to physical characteristics such as "kadadat", meaning to possess only half of your original teeth; "tivili", for a person with three dents in the belly (from fatness); and my favourite, "miyulesa", for a woman with the eyes of a deer.

Lalike other popular trapping descriptions

Unlike other popular tropical des-tinations, Sri Lanka remains rela-tively unspoilt. The war is finished, the tsunami is a decade gone and the highways now connect the island efficiently. With tourism rates projected to rise and rise over the next few years, now is the perfect time to visit.

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
